Pre-plan Your Own Place to Rest In Style...

Have you ever thought about where you want your final resting place to be? We oftentimes show you monuments and markers, niches in the Columbarium, and even memorial benches. As you drive through the cemetery you might wonder about the private mausoleums within the cemetery or the statues of beautiful women. If you have lived your life well, saved your money, and are not sure how to celebrate your life when it is time for you to rest, then preplan now. Make your own decisions. Place a grand statue on top of your gravesite like the industrial magnates of the past, choose your own location, or even decide to reside in a private mausoleum.



John Addison Porter - (1856-1900) - Secretary to the US President

John Addison Porter was born in New Haven on April 17, 1856. His parents were John Addison Porter and Josephine Earl Sheffield Porter.

Porter attended Hopkins Grammar School in New Haven and then the Russell Military Academy also of New Haven. He graduated from Yale College with a Bachelor's degree in 1878 and a Master's degree in 1881.

In 1880, Porter joined the staff of the *Hartford Observer* and was a reporter for a brief time on the New Haven *Daily Palladium* and the *Hartford Courant*. In 1882, he became the literary editor of the *New*

York Observer. Then moved to Washington DC to continue his newspaper work.

In 1884, Porter served as secretary to William Walter Phelps, a member of the House of Representatives, and as a clerk on the select Senate committee on Indian affairs.

In 1886, Porter moved to Pomfret Connecticut. He purchased a one third interest in the *Hartford Evening Post*.

In 1887, Porter fell ill and spent the winter in the south. When he returned to Connecticut, he purchased an estate in Pomfret, where he lived until his death.

In 1891, Porter served as a representative from Pomfret in the Connecticut Legislature. In 1892, he became a delegate to the Republican national convention in Minneapolis. In 1894, 1896, and 1898 Porter was a Republican nominee for governor of Connecticut. He influenced the Connecticut delegate to cast their votes for William McKinley at the St. Louis convention.

In 1893, he organized the McKinley Club of Hartford and became president of that

McKinley appointed Porter to the position of Secretary



to the President of the United States in February of 1897, however, illness in the spring of 1899 interfered with his duties and he had to resign his position in May of 1900.

Porter passed at the age of 44 and is resting here at Evergreen.
